### Met Police Cadets celebrate an amazing year at second annual awards ceremony

On 7<sup>th</sup> January 2016, The London Oratory School welcomed back Met Police Cadets together with senior officers, directors, friends and family to celebrate their impressive achievements during 2015.



Inspector Helen Harper opened with a review of the year which included the Trafalgar Square parade, Trooping the Colour and the Notting Hill Carnival as well as the most successful Takeover Day yet which saw 75 cadets step in to the shoes of senior officers and staff for the day . This was organised by Lucy O'Mahony, a manager in the Youth Engagement Team.

The VPC now numbers 4,410 cadets and, to put that in perspective, Helen Harper explained "if you all attend the competition this year, we'll need 12,000 hens just to lay the eggs for your breakfast."

The awards then began with senior leaders from each of the 32 boroughs announcing the winners of their Ambassador and Junior Cadet awards. Jo Amand from the Duke of Edinburgh's award then took to the stage to recognise the Bikes to Gambia project led by Tom Morris and Gill di Martinez. This team has made a major difference to the lives of the young people who received the bicycles as, without them, they would have no means to get to school. Head of the Directorate of Media and Communication, Martin Fewell, was invited to present a new award to the Cyber Crime team. Their work to combat this increasingly important issue has had such a positive impact that an item about it even appeared on the ITV evening news.

The evening culminated in the announcement of:

Tom Langham as staff member of the year. He has found time to give 400 hours of service while running his own business (which he sometimes closes early to get to cadets on time);

Jayne Richardson as co-ordinator of the year.
Winning for an impressive third year running,
Jayne runs an active cadet programme as well as the Iron Man competition – happily with excellent support from her family;

 Matteo Bynoe from Kensington and Chelsea as Junior Cadet of the Year;

Valicious joined the Volunteer Police Cadets (VPC) in Southwark two years ago, where he is currently Head Cadet of our South Unit. He's flourished into a strong leader, firm and authoritative when needed, yet always approachable and willing to selflessly help others, setting an exemplary example through a consistent approach to resolving conflict and engaging with his VPC peers in Southwark and beyond in all aspects of cadet life. His potential had been noted from the outset as he was polite, listened carefully and acted with integrity, always keen to get involved in volunteering and possessing a drive for knowledge and understanding through active and positive participation in the class and in the community.

Closing the evening, Assistant Commissioner Helen King commented "Robert Peel once said ... the public are the police, and the police are the public. There can be no better example of this than the VPC. You are a key part of the MPS family and we are immensely proud of you."

### Cadets building links in Haringey.

Haringey Sea Cadet unit has been home to the local Air Cadet Squadron and Army Cadet Detachment for the past year. The Army Cadets and Air Cadets usual homes are undergoing refurbishments and rebuilds so they were looking for somewhere to parade. TS Wizard Sea Cadets came to the rescue.

But these relationships are not the only things to have been built. Cadets from all three uniformed youth groups have taken part in a project with the Volunteer It Yourself (VIY) organisation to carry out works on the unit. Together with some help from Edmonton Sea Cadets the young people have redecorated the entire interior of the unit and used carpentry skills to erect a brand new toilet block.

Throughout the project the cadets were trained in vocational disciplines from professional tradesmen and were assessed by examiners. VIY were able

to award the group of over 25 young people aged 14-24 City and Guilds qualifications in painting and decorating and carpentry.

The sharing of facilities and parade nights for the past has built friendships and a real sense of community in the cadet forces of Haringey and Tottenham, and the project carried out at the unit on White Hart Lane is a real testament to the benefit of tri-service co-operation.

The Air Cadet Squadron and the Army Cadet Detachment will soon be moving into their new building but all the volunteers and cadets involved are keen to uphold the links and relationships they have built.



It is also one of the oldest tracing its history back to 1859.

Some of our activities have a military theme, others have more of a community focus but they all inspire young people to challenge their limits, become more independent, confident and able to step up to any challenge.

The Army Cadet Force is one of four cadet organisations sponsored and supported by the Ministry of Defence, the others being the Combined Cadet Force, the Sea Cadet Corps, and the Air Training Corps. Although they are sponsored by the Ministry of Defence there is no obligation on cadets to join the Armed Forces.

There are over 120 Army Cadet Units (Detachments) across London's four sectors ( counties) - Middlesex and Northwest London ACF, South West London ACF, South East London ACF and City of London and North East Sector. Most parade (meet) two nights a week in the evenings and have weekends away as well as a two week annual camp in the Summer at an army base somewhere in the UK.

# Leadership training at HMS PRESIDENT

15-17 January 2016 saw the latest Senior Cadet Leadership Course (SCLC); part of the *London Leaders Development Scheme* (LLDS). The Scheme aims to develop leaders of uniformed youth organisations in London both to deliver better services to the young people they serve and develop their own skills in the process.

Based on an original concept proposed by London Sea Cadets, they initially delivered the SCLC in partnership with the Volunteer Police Cadets who subsequently used the model to develop their own internal version. St John Ambulance joined the venture in 2013 and the London Fire Brigade joined last year. This most recent course saw 40 cadets from the four organisations and their staff join forces for the first time.

> The SCLC is a unique partnership between uniformed youth organisations in London. It brings together their most senior young people to learn from

each other and their guests to help tackle some of London's youth challenges. The course was inspired by research from the Institute of Leadership & Management which found many modern business leaders (particularly women) start their leadership learning in these types of youth organisation. The SCLC is specifically designed to provide a direct link from what cadets gain from belonging to skills and attributes that make them employable, a beneficial part of society, and make a greater contribution to their own organisations.

The cadets learn a variety of skills, often beyond what is usually taught in the cadet movement.



Communication,

conflict management, positive role

modelling and social skills are all part of the course. Whether it is being questioned by a panel of employers after a presentation or entertaining high profile guests at a formal dinner, the SCLC aims to challenge young people in innovative ways to help them get a head start in life.

The course is not something found elsewhere within the participating organisations. The direct link to employability, the contrast between different organisations and the scale and type of external support is not replicated in any part of the participants' organisational training programmes. The SCLC is also linked to other schemes such as livery company apprenticeships and even employment access opportunities. # News from the last quarter

# Flying High?

Exchange Visit by St. Dunstan's College CCF (Royal Navy)

Lewisham ATC Squadron played host to senior cadets from St. Dunstan's College CCF (Royal Navy) Section this week, as part of our effort to engage and improve our NCO team development.

The visiting Navy NCOs spent time learning about the structural and practical differences in the two cadet environments,



before meeting their Air Cadet counterparts for a full discussion of operations and experiences. The Navy NCOs watched the Air Cadets going about a regular parade night - from Flight management, to uniform inspections, drill training and key event operations.

They also spent time with the Squadron's flight simulator - learning principles of flight on the Grob Tutor, before taking on more complex challenges including flying a Boeing 737 around London's airports.



"Although we all have slightly different styles, structures and uniforms, the cadet forces are very

similar and have lots more in common than we think. We don't claim to be expert in anything", commented Flt Lt David Preece, OC 1921, "but we always love to learn and share ideas. It's the heart of what we do; and while the Squadron's cadets can do it as part of London Wing, the opportunities to work with other youth organisations in Lewisham is really important too. "
