### **LEADERSHIP WEEKEND CONT...**

The annual YOU London Leadership Development Weekend saw over 100 participants each day from 11 different organisations (Army Cadet Force, Boys' Brigade, Fire Cadets, Girlguiding, Girls' Brigade, RAF Air Cadets, Scouts, Sea Cadets, St John Ambulance Cadets, Trinity School CCF and Volunteer Police Cadets) take part in an inspiring weekend of speakers and practical activities designed to strengthen the delegates' leadership, communication and teamwork skills.

This year, the event was hosted by Trinity School in Croydon over the weekend of 1–2 November. The challenges over 2 days ranged from a trek cart slalom race, creatively bridging across platforms, blindfold and memory tests, building a vertical structure, CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) including how to use a defibrillator, conducting a mock forensic search, and searching for an indeterminate number of casualties in a smoke filled room with zero visibility. The stand activities were delivered by the Metropolitan Police Service Volunteer Police Cadets, London Fire Brigade Fire Cadets, Army Engagement Team, Royal Navy Attract Team, St John Ambulance, Scouts and Trinity School CCF.



Conference speakers shared valuable lessons on personal growth and resilience. Hubert Mensah, Firefighter, First Aid Trainer and former Police Cadet, spoke about the importance of resilience and building strong support networks. Sir Kenneth Olisa OBE, Lord-Lieutenant of Greater London, offered an uplifting message about positivity and maintaining perspective. Mark Dean, Guinness World Record holder and former Nigerian Rugby Manager, reminded the delegates not to define themselves solely by their careers, but to keep an open mind to future possibilities.

A number of visitors, including Natasha Irons MP, and the civic and elected Mayors of Croydon, visited the event to witness the activities and chat to the young people between tasks. All those who visited said they were hugely impressed by the event and by the energy and enthusiasm of the participants.

A big thank you to the dozens of adult volunteers who supported the weekend - either by delivering activities or speeches or simply being on site to accompany the young people.

Held by kind permission of the Dean, the reception brought together civic leaders, youth representatives and volunteers to highlight the transformative impact these proven organisations can have on young people's skill development, social inclusion, social mobility, employability and mental health.



Guests heard powerful testimonies from young people and adult volunteers who spoke movingly about their experiences with these organisations, and the skills and benefits they have gained whilst making a positive difference to their local community.

Attendees were encouraged to leave the reception inspired to spread the word – to raise the profile of uniformed youth groups in their local communities and to encourage volunteer recruitment to ensure every young person has access to these opportunities.



The evening finished with a spectacular glow-in-the-dark drumming display by South East London Army Cadet Force Corps of Drums.

## EAST LONDON COMMUNITY NETWORKING RECEPTION

YOU London hosted a community networking reception at Kingsford Community School in Beckton on Monday 1 December to raise awareness of the fantastic opportunities provided by uniformed youth groups in the London Boroughs of Barking and Dagenham, Newham and Redbridge, and their ability to change lives. The evening brought together youth organisations, community leaders, policy makers and local supporters to promote and celebrate the beneficial impact of uniformed youth groups, to celebrate the invaluable contributions of adult volunteers and to raise awareness of the continual need for more.



The evening began with a warm welcome from Joan Deslandes OBE, Head Teacher of Kingsford Community School, whose staff and pupils showcased so effectively both the school and its values. Professor Richard Hazenberg, co-author of <u>The Impact and Value of School-based Cadet Forces in the UK</u>, presented the findings of his report which concluded that pupils who are members of CCFs do better at school, have improved attendance and behaviour and are more likely to go to university.

Debbie Wilkinson DL, YOU London Co-ordinator, hosted a short Q&A discussion with young people and adult volunteers from uniformed youth groups in Barking and Dagenham, Newham and Redbridge to hear why they volunteer and what they get from it. Colonel Jane Davis OBE QVRM TD DL, Vice Lord-Lieutenant of Greater London, drew the speeches to a close by thanking the school for hosting the reception and encouraging attendees to take the messages they had heard into their communities.

The evening concluded with a fantastic performance by the band of 282 (East Ham) Squadron RAF Air Cadets who played a medley they had created themselves of Christmas, traditional and modern tunes.


#### **FUNDRAISING THANK YOU**

Major Norman Fontaine-Thompson, Officer Commanding 15 Company, South West London Army Cadet Force, undertook the London T100 Triathlon on Sunday 10 August, raising £475 in sponsorship for YOU London. This Olympic-distance triathlon was a massive challenge: a 1.5km swim in Royal Victoria Dock, a 40km cycle past iconic landmarks like Big Ben and Tower Bridge, and a 10km run through the Docklands.

Maj Fontaine-Thompson completed his first triathlon just one year ago, to lose weight and challenge himself. The London T100 was his first Olympic-distance event – double the distance of anything he had done before.

He said: "It was an amazing experience and great to raise money for YOU London to help support youth organisations in London. I'm signing up to the T100 full 100 distance next year and hope to be able to fundraise for YOU again."

#### **DEPUTY LIEUTENANT CERTIFICATES**

### The nomination process for 2026 Deputy Lieutenant Certificate submissions is open until Friday 6 February 2026.

The Deputy Lieutenant Certificate scheme is open to all YOU London organisations. Certificates are awarded to young people (aged 15 or over on 31 January 2026) to give recognition to their achievements within their organisation and to create an awareness of their contribution within the community. Nominations should be completed initially by unit/group leaders, then sent to the next level up to put forward ideally one or two candidates from each organisation per borough.

The question to be asked of a unit/group is 'Who are the best young people you have in your unit/group and what have they achieved?' Differences between organisations make it impracticable to stipulate the qualifications required for an award, but candidates are expected to be worthy representatives of their organisation, assessed on professional performance, personal qualities, social responsibility and other achievements in fields such as education, sport and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

To be eligible for a certificate, a young person must belong to a unit situated within a London borough. Deputy Lieutenant Certificates will be presented by the Representative Deputy Lieutenant for that borough during the course of 2026. Presentation events vary widely from visits to units, to a joint presentation with the Mayor.

#### **CAMPING ON THE UNDERGROUND**

#### Looking for places to stay around London?

A big thank you to Scout leaders from Southwark, West London and North London districts who have produced this fun guide to <u>Scout Camping on the Underground</u>. This mini website contains a <u>map</u> and <u>list</u> of Scoutowned and Scout-friendly campsites that can be reached using public transport to help volunteer leaders run a low-cost overnight camp for small groups carrying their own equipment without the need for a minibus, ambitious programme or expensive catering. Whilst this project was undertaken for the Scouts, many campsites will accept bookings from other uniformed youth organisations.

The <u>Girlguiding website</u> also features a <u>map</u> and <u>list</u> of approved national residential venues, which includes 23 options in Greater London.

Or for a very different overnight experience, the Imperial War Museum offer young people the chance to 'Kip on a Ship' aboard HMS Belfast. A variety of packages, starting from £58 per person, are available. Popular with groups visiting London, 'Kip on a Ship' provides a unique opportunity to stay on the Thames in the heart of the city.

#### WHAT IF EVERYONE STOPPED **VOLUNTEERING?**

YOU London is quoted in a new national report that was published in September. This ground-breaking report asks the question: What if everyone stopped volunteering? It looks at the impact on our health system, the environment, education and young people, law and justice, democracy, heritage, community resilience, emergency response and our communities, and concludes with the statement: 'It's not a question of whether the country can afford to support volunteering more, but can the country afford not to?'
